<b>Estadio Deportivo</b> Cali, Colombia	September 2006 \$70	52,000 Cali Sports
<i>FEATURES:</i> The country's first soccer stadium owned and operated by a Colombian soccer club; 817 suites, a museum and a special theater seating area for government officials and sports icons.		
<b>Arena Multiuso</b> Salvador, Brazil	December 2006 \$50	32,000 City
<i>FEATURES:</i> To anchor a planned urban community in Salvador and book events for professional soccer games and bullfights; set to be the regional qualifier for the 2010 Brazilian national team to send to World Cup.		
<b>Chivas Soccer Stadium</b> Guadalajara, Mexico	December 2006 \$88	45,000 Chivas Soccer Team
<i>FEATURES:</i> Designed by HOK; includes 4,560 club seats, 1,500 VIP seats and 308 luxury suites; built inside of a grass berm.		
<b>Havelange Olympic Stadium</b> Rio de Janeiro, Brazil	Early 2007 \$100	45,000 City
<i>FEATURES:</i> Designed by Sergio Dias; site of the 2007 Pan American Games; expandable to 60,000 seats; designed with 98 spectator boxes and a nearby shopping district with 42 stores.		
<b>Estadio Libertadores de Americas</b> Avellaneda, Argentina	Spring 2007 \$15 renovation	43,000 Independiente Football Club
<i>FEATURES:</i> Third-largest soccer stadium in the country; originally built in 1928; restoration to improve entry and access ways and come into line with new FIFA standards.		
<b>Arena Joinville</b> Brazil	Summer 2007 \$3 expansion	30,000 City
<i>FEATURES:</i> First built in 2004; being nearly doubled in sized to 30,000 seats; used for soccer and bullfighting matches.		
<b>Estadio Olimpico Municipal</b> Chimbote, Peru	January 2008 \$66	31,000 Peruvian National Government
<i>FEATURES:</i> Soccer and concert facility; the first new stadium construction project in Peru in 35 years.
