<b>LUCAS OIL STADIUM</b> Indianapolis, Ind.	\$500 63,000-75,000 seats	Late 2008 NA	<b>Marion County, Indianapolis Colts National Football League team</b> Built in downtown Indianapolis; includes retractable roof
<b>RED BULL PARK</b> Harrison, N.J.	\$100 25,000 seats	Late 2008 Rossetti	<b>Red Bull Park LLC; AEG Live, New York Red Bulls MLS Franchise</b> Fully enclosed with metal roof; design intending to make park "the loudest soccer park in the U.S."
<b>COWBOY STADIUM</b> Arlington, Texas	\$650 75,000 seats	2009 HKS	<b>Dallas Cowboys NFL team</b> Ultra-high tech stadium will feature two of the world's largest LED screens including an end-zone facing screen measuring in at 48 feet by 27 feet, as well as gigantic side-facing screens, measuring 180 feet by 50 feet. Will also include 33 sideline suites.
<b>NEW YANKEES STADIUM</b> New York	\$1,000 51,800 seats	Fall 2009 HKS	<b>New York Yankees</b> New design consists of two separate structures; an exterior with a wall circling the perimeter of the Yankees' new property, resembling the pre-renovation exterior of the original Yankee Stadium.
<b>SUMMIT COUNTY SOCCER STADIUM</b> Summit, Ohio	NA 20,000 seats	Fall 2009 Rossetti	<b>Wolstein Sports and Entertainment Group; MLS expansion team</b> Will include Ohio's first retractable roof and retractable field adjacent to 25 youth soccer fields.
<b>CITI FIELD</b> New York	\$610 42,500 seats	Fall 2009 HOK	<b>City of New York; New York Mets</b> Originally part of New York's failed bid for the 2012 Olympics; Citibank agreed to \$400 million, 20-year deal for naming rights.
<b>TCF BANK STADIUM</b> Minneapolis	\$248 50,000 seats	Fall 2009 HOK	<b>University of Minnesota</b> "Horse-shoe" designed stadium funded through state monies, a \$35-million naming rights deal with TCF Bank and \$10 annual student fees.
<b>MINNESOTA TWINS BALLPARK</b> Minneapolis	\$520 42,000 seats	Fall 2010 HOK	<b>City of Minneapolis and State of Minnesota; Minnesota Twins MLB team</b> The concourses will be open to the playing field with a view of the downtown Minneapolis skyline from every seat; a proposed retractable roof for the field was cancelled because of cost.
<b>CISCO FIELD</b> Fremont, Calif.	\$400 36,000 seats	2010 360 Architects	<b>Oakland Athletics MLS</b> Billed as one of the most technologically advanced ballparks in the U.S., built on a 143-acre parcel owned by Cisco Systems. It will be one of the smallest stadiums in Major League Baseball.
